SEPTEMBER MEETING MINUTES

General Meeting Minutes
Olathe Quilter's Guild
September 15, 2020

President Teresa Jones opened the meeting at 6:30 p.m. on September 15 instead of September 8 due to rainy weather. It was held in the parking lot of Olathe Christian Church with a microphone and speaker brought by Teresa's daughter and son-in-law, Ashley & Matt Copeland. Members placed their folding chairs at a 6 foot distance from each other, and wore masks to avoid spreading the coronavirus. Teresa read the names of September birthdays to applause for each member, and again welcomed new member Beth DeLapp.

Mary Ellen Winter led a guild activity. Graph paper was passed and members drew a quilt block and colored it. These were turned in, then members drew out someone else's block to make at home in French Country blue and yellow which will be made into a quilt. Gretchen Schafer has volunteered to quilt it. Then it will be auctioned off, with proceeds going to the Charity Committee. She also gave a quiz of quilting terms and the winners were Heather Schaller, Sherri Irving and Linda Hagen. The winner of the drawing by the KCRQF committee was Carol Crane, a ticket for the Opportunity Quilt. Sign-ups were accepted for Show and Tell during the 10 minute break. All were encouraged to visit the KCRQF sales table, and the Ways and Means table.

After the break the business meeting was held. Cheryl Wilcox made a motion to approve the minutes of the last business meeting August 11th, and Pauline Sanders seconded. The vote was affirmative. Janie Benander made a motion to accept the treasurer's report, which was seconded by Kenda Camp and adopted.

The next workshop sponsored by K-State Extension will be September 22nd, 6:00-8:00 pm via Zoom. Cindy Nice will be teaching an easy jelly roll pillow cover. Mary Pacey will teach the workshop on October 27th, which will be wool applique on a penny table runner. Those who register should pick up a kit of materials at the Extension office. Mary will welcome additional donations of wool scraps. Please contact Mary if you have workshop ideas for the future.

Charity Committee: Cindy Nice announced that Jessie VandenBerg made five charity quilts this month. She still has two tubs of quilt tops that need to be finished. She said quilting may be done by decorative stitches on a domestic sewing machine, as Janie Benander did, or even bar tacks.

Teresa read the new slate of officers to serve in 2021, to be voted on in October, as follows: President Libby Corrison, Vice President Nicolette Deplazes, Program Chair Mary Ellen Winter, Program Elect Sheri Keller, Secretary Carol Crane, Treasurer Rachel Rohrer, Ways & Means Karen Genis, Ways & Means elect currently unfilled, Historian Cheryl Wilcox, Public Relations Janice Meloan and Kathy Manning, Membership Jean Heer, Newsletter Editor Jenny Boudreaux, Advisor Teresa Jones.

Gretchen Ryan of the Welcome Table reported 37 members present. Sheila Pierce won the drawing.

The next meeting will be October 13 with Ashley Copeland as speaker. It will be set up closer to the church building, and a spotlight will be used since it is getting dark earlier.

Jenny Boudreaux reported that Once We Were Refugees is once again accepting donations of machines and any and all sewing needs.

An antique quilt donated to the guild was offered in a silent auction handled by Linda Hagen. Sherri Irving won the quilt for \$30 which will benefit the Charity Committee.

TURNING IN CHARITY PROJECTS



NOTES FROM MEMBERS

Kerri Robinson, who is still a member of our guild even though she has moved to Texas, sent this note after she received several items in the mail from guild members:

"I was released from the hospital yesterday (the second time) and when I got home there were so many get well cards from Olathe Guild Members. Today I took time to read each one and so many people were praying for my recover and had such kind words. It really made me feel so loved and I want everyone to know how much I appreciate the cards, prayers and kind words. I fell on the Wednesday the 16th, walking the dog fractured my head in 3 places, but I remember nothing, I was released from the hospital on Sept 19th, but readmitted on the 22 because I could not keep medication down. No walking the dog for a while and it may be a month or more before I'm able to quilt... right now I'm become addicted to Netflix! Let everyone know how I appreciate all the cards I received, they really lifted my spirits!"

KCRQF - UPDATE ON THE FESTIVAL

The KCRQF Board met with guild representatives on Saturday 9/19 at the Prairie Baptist church with several members attending via Microsoft Teams. Our Olathe Guild provided the online meeting setup.

- WE NEED A VOLUNTEER OR TWO from the guild to organize our guild quilts. Mary Ellen has offered to do a lot of the work but she does need help.
- We have raised & deposited \$645 in merchandise!!!!
- 3 guilds have pulled out of the festival – Topeka, Blue Valley & KC Modern. This leaves quilt hanging, bus ambassadors & concierge without a guild in charge:
 - **Concierge** – This may be taken over by Quilters Guild of Greater KC pending their board review in coming weeks. They had responsibility for White Gloving but that will not be a requirement as there will be boxes of plastic gloves near all of the quilts. The concierge will likely have 1 volunteer at the door entrance to the quilt rooms reminding visitors to glove up.
 - **Bus Ambassadors** – Kathy Limpic will take on the bus organizing & utilize the concierge committee volunteers to greet buses on their arrival.
 - **Quilt Hanging** – This will be distributed across all guilds. Each guild will hang & drop their own quilts & a portion of the judged quilts. Mary Ellen & I have been asked to be the “chaos coordinators” during hanging & dropping times. We’ve agreed as we figure this is a single day commitment for the most part & something we can tackle with just 1-2 helpers.

To minimize costs, the festival has approached the OPCC about dropping the ballroom & reducing our room load at the Sheraton. The ballroom is contingent upon it being reserved for an alternate use – but June and many delayed weddings has the OPCC confident it will be snapped up for part of the time. What does that mean for layout?

- The entry will be the doors used in 2017. Tickets however will be taken right after you turn the corner from the escalator. That entire hallway will have vendors as will the interior of the convention room. Aisles have been widened from prior years. The festival will have 1 way suggested paths, signs suggesting limited capacity inside each booth etc. Nothing will be policed but the festival will be doing their due diligence to have suggestions in place.
- Pipe & Drape costs are being reduced with no carpeting being used (\$11k for carpet alone) and some other savings opportunities.
- Guild Opportunity Quilt booths will be on the main floor where open seating has been in the past – in front of the classrooms. Each guild will have a 10x10 booth. The Merchandise booth will also be in this area.

KCRQF UPDATE (continued)

- Guild Quilts will be in the main convention room upstairs with the vendors along the north wall.
- Judged & Challenge Quilts (other than the 2 winners which will be in plexiglass again) will be in the largest classroom on the main floor – near the Opportunity Quilt Booths. 6 classrooms are single rooms & the last is a double room – the double room is where the quilt showing will be. You WILL need a hand stamp to enter this room. Tickets will be taken upstairs and your hand immediately stamped.

Other bits of news:

- Tickets will be \$17 (from \$17.50) at the door; \$15 in advance for single day. Kids < 3 are FREE & 4-12 \$10/day. Kids tickets are only available at the door.
- Some teachers include Julia Quiltoff, Angela Walters & Tia Curtis will be in the 1 long arm room provided by Handi Quilter. Jacquie Gering & Susan Cleveland are a few other big name quilters. I (Heather) personally LOVE LOVE LOVE Jacquie. If you aren't familiar with either of these quilters, please check them out.
- QuiltArt Engagement calendar has chosen 3 guild quilts from the last festival to include in their 2022 calendar – so keep that in mind when making your guild quilt entries!
- Country Heritage Tours will be bringing 2 buses in on Friday with an overnight stay. They will also have a bus coming through earlier in the week with an option for bus go-ers to stay the weekend at the Sheraton.

Guild booth sizes have been determined. Olathe will have 4 10x10 booths (3 sides each) with 10x8'tall walls. We can request a bar at 3' high for any walls we like – the more small quilts we have the more we can show! Start working on those wall hangings now.

As I said at the start - we still need a guild quilt coordinator. Mary Ellen has said she can help with the wall design & organizing – she'd like a helper or two (or three) to help measure & photograph quilts as we have in prior years. We will also be responsible for HANGING AT THE FESTIVAL – 2-3 volunteers for the day before to hang our Olathe Guild quilts & 2-3 to take them down at the end.
