Coming Up in August





Our August Speaker is Lori Triplett with Pieces of the Prairie

Lori Lee Triplett, Business Manager for Quilt and Textile Collections, has successfully combined a variety of passions which include research, writing, and performing into the quilt world. As a lecturer and instructor she brings her experience from stage, screen, and radio to make the presentations fun yet educational. Depending on which program she is performing, you may meet one of her guests from abroad, sing-a-long with a song, or even participate in solving a mystery. She enjoys presenting at local quilt guilds, but also presents at national conferences and has made appearances internationally.

As an award winning writer Lori has written more than 15 books and numerous magazine articles. Her most recent book written with her

sister, *Pioneer Quilts*, examines the great western migration of the pioneers. The book uses 30 different quilts to tell the pioneer story through the eyes of Esther Heinzmann. Her previous book, *Indigo Quilts*, covers the history of indigo from Africa to America. Additionally the book includes detailed photos of African textiles and antique quilts from the Poos Collection as well as five projects. The *Indigo Quilts* book received the Lucy Hilty Research Grant and the Meredith Scholar Award. The successful *Chintz Quilts from the Poos Collection* launched in the fall of 2013 and was co-written with Kay Triplett and Xenia Cord.

An art quilter Lori prefers to work with hand dyed or hand painted fabric to create. Her art work has been featured in multiple exhibitions, websites, publications, and books. She is an international award winning artist including from the National Endowment for the Arts: American Masterpiece. In 2018 she received the ARTSKC: Inspiration Grant for a community art project using quilted panels to

decorate a playground fence in the inner city. Her artwork has been published in newspapers, magazines, postcards, and calendars. Her solo exhibition, Reflections, traveled for more than a year at a variety of locations. Her art can be found in private and corporate collections, museums, and at the Arts Alliance Gift Shop. She is currently creating quilts for two solo quilt exhibitions: Tree of Life and Indigo Images.

She is a member of the American Quilt Study Group, American Quilter's Society, Heartland Quilt Network, The International Quilt Study Center & Museum, Modern Quilt Guild and SAQA (Studio Art Quilts Associates.) She is a graduate of the University of Arkansas with a Bachelor of Arts with honors, and a Masters of Arts from the UMKC Theatre Department. Additionally she has law degree from UMKC School of Law where she received multiple awards.




Our August Workshop—English Paper Piecing

August 21, 2018 at the Extension Office—Room 1060—led by Carolyn Chaffin

English Paper Piecing dates back to the late 1700's when hexagon quilts became popular. This is a hand-stitched technique that uses templates cut in a variety of shapes and basting fabric around the shape. We will be making a Grandmother's Flower Garden circle with hexagons.

SUPPLY LIST: Hand sewing supplies- needles (milliners 10 or 11, embroidery & straw work well also), needle threader (if needed), pins, thread (cotton or blend) and scissors. Fabric: one 3-inch square for the center of your circle, six 3-inch squares for the first ring of your flower. If you want to make more rounds, add the previous numbers, plus six, so the next ring is 12 squares, 3rd ring 18 squares and so on.



Instructor will provide: samples, cardboard templates, instruction sheet

For information about the August 11th New York Beauty Class, the flyer for the class is provided as an attachment with the newsletter email again this month.

The final workshop scheduled at the Extension Office in 2018 is Machine Applique on October 23rd, led by Cindy Nice.





Spotlight Quilter of the Month—Jean Schlenk

When I was 8 years old, my mom and my sister made a wardrobe for a 14-inch doll I received for Christmas. I have done garment sewing and craft sewing all my life, including lots of doll clothes and Halloween costumes for my three kids and five grandkids over the years. I hope my legacy will include "My Grandma made this for me!"

I have sewn a lot of home decor and craft items for family and friends. One was a teddy bear made from neckties belonging to the father of a friend. That got me interested in quilting and machine embroidery.

One day I turned around and had to think about retirement and realized I already had a fabric stash, so I started looking for classes at quilt stores. In 2010, I took a free motion quilting class at Quilters' Haven and met Kerri Robinson. We became quilting buddies and we took a lot of classes and road trips together. My favorite quilting memories are the road trips and shop hops that I've taken with friends. I've been a member of the Olathe quilting guild since 2015, where I enjoy the meetings, the speakers and the programs, along with the quilting sisterhood.

I normally don't buy fabric without a project in mind, unless it's music themed or sewing themed. I keep small scraps in a large drawer cabinets. The rest in various glass fronted cabinets, like lawyers cabinets and retired china cabinets that I have rescued from garage and estate sales.

My favorite technique is paper piecing. A close second is T-shirt quilts for my grandchildren. I usually make quilts with someone in mind. I entered my Harry Potter paper pieced book case quilt in the 2017 KCRQF. That was the first quilt that I long armed myself, and I presented it proudly to my daughter-in-law.

I machine piece on a variety of vintage and modern sewing machines. Collecting and restoring vintage Singers has become a hobby for me, and for my husband now that he's retired. My favorite tool is an old fashioned seam guide that I discovered in a box of tools that I have from my mothers 1934 Singer. It helps me makes good quarter-inch seams that are nice and straight.

My quilting advice: Make ripping part of the process (instead of dreading it).




Committee Updates



KCRQF Meeting Updates for July 2018— from Janie Benander

- We were the first to turn in our block for the Festival Guild Quilt Pattern. (The Friendship Star pictured on right)
- We should have a list of teachers in August that have signed contracts so far
- We will have a judged quilt show section, all quilts will be accepted on first come basis until space is filled. Space has not yet been determined.
- Some guilds felt that the winners of the Guild Quilt Show and the Judged Show did not receive enough recognition in the past and recommended changes, such as prizes and recognition at the Show.



- There are approximately 40 plus vendors who have signed contracts. Currently, we do not have a lot of Quilt Shops signed up as vendors.
- Quilt Sampler Magazine with the KCRQF 2019 ad will be on the newsstands on August 28th. The other ad will be in the Spring of 2019
- Blue Valley Guild will have the committee to handle judged quilts
- All mini quilts must be turned in by April 20, 2019 to the KCRQF committee. But, mini quilts can be handed in each month at the KCRQF meeting. No labels or sleeves will be needed on the mini quilts. A Bio will be turned in with each mini quilt, including who made the quilt, any inspiration information or background on the quilt process, etc. can be included in the Bio. If the maker does not want to be identified, NO Bio should be turned in with the quilt. Do Not Low Ball 'Buy It Now' prices. No rules regarding the mini quilts, EXCEPT that no side of the quilt can EXCEED 24". Any shape, technique, etc. is acceptable. But they must be a quilt with three layers. Please forward any mini quilts to Janie or Cindy to be submitted to the Sunflower Guild at the monthly KCRQF meetings the third Saturday of each month.
- The change to the by-laws to include the addition of a new Executive Board Position of Vice-President Elect was approved by the Member Board of Directors
- A list of Proposed Quilt Categories was handed out for review by the Member Representatives.

Action Items

• Take a show of hands at our August Guild meeting to see how many members of our guild plan to submit a quilt for the Guild Quilt Show. We need to get a feel for the number of quilts our Guild plans to submit for the Guild Quilt portion of the Show. The board has NOT determined how space will be allocated for the Guild quilts yet. In the past, space was allocated based off Guild membership numbers. This is just to get a feel for how many quilts per Guild are planned now. Information of note- the age of the Quilts to be accepted into the show has NOT yet been determined and NO Quilt shown at the past two KCRQF events will be eligible.

- We have been asked to identify who the Guild member(s) will be that will coordinate the Guild Quilts for our Guild for KCRQF 2019. Starlight Guild is doing Quilt Registration for 2019, (what Arlene and Susan did for the KCRQF in 2015 and 2017). Our coordinators will be invited to a meeting in October with Kim Cawthon and Janette Sheldon who are heading the Quilt Registration Committee.
- Submit suggestions regarding appropriate prizes for the Quilt Show winners. Guild members should bring suggestions to Janie Benander and/or Cindy Nice who will forward them.
- Ask if we have any graphic artists or designers in our Guilds that would be willing to help the
 festival on the Show Book at our next Guild meeting and in our newsletters.
- Please send Pam Coleman an update on the Lincoln Bus Trip that we will be opening to non-members as of July 31.
- Encourage submission of as many mini quilts as possible to the Charity Silent Auction/Buy It
 Now effort. It has been determined that we want as many as 200 mini quilts for the charity silent auction/buy it now event.
- The President of each Guild is asked to submit the names of Guild members willing to fill the new VP Elect positions on the Executive Board via the Guild Representatives by the August 18th meeting. The President will submit a brief paragraph regarding the members experience in work or Guild activities and quilting background. These guild members will be asked to come speak with the Executive Board and Member Representatives on September 15 at the monthly KCRQF meeting. Roles and Responsibilities to be documented and sent out by Pam Coleman shortly.

"It's in the Bag Challenge"

This challenge is for you to make any kind of bag! Grocery bag, travel bag, lunch bag ... the list is endless!

The only rule is that the bag must have been made this year.

Completed bags are due at the October meeting.

Also remember the 'Show Us Your Curves' challenge is due at the November Guild meeting

General Meeting Minutes Olathe Quilters Guild July 10, 2018

We were pleased to learn that Peggy Souag and Heather Schaller also became members by joining the Guild this evening. Mary recognized Deb Lybarger, our June Featured Quilter and Shari Pine, July Featured Quilter. She announced the month's birthdays and invited those members to receive a small gift from the Guild.

Pam Pearson then introduced our evening's speaker, Raija Salomaa who presented her program *My Journey as a Pattern Designer*. Raija detailed the successes and frustrations of designing patterns in the quilting world. As a native of Finland, she also explained how she came to the United States.

After the speaker's presentation we adjourned for a break to purchase basket raffle tickets, pick up Mystery Quilt patterns and sign up for the Lincoln bus trip. Raija also had items for sale and there was the Free Flea Market Table to peruse. Janie Benander announced that blocks for the President's Quilt were available to be picked up during the break, as well. 


