


# At Our December meeting

## 2019 Workshops

## January 29—Embroidery—Led by Arlene Banks

Grab a friend and come learn to embroider. It can be done while riding in the car, while waiting at children's practices, or at a game and (my favorite) while watching TV. In Beginning Embroidery you will learn the stem stitch, the back stitch, the daisy stitch, the blanket stitch and French knots.

I will explain how and why I use an interfacing, different ways to trace patterns and the types of pens used to trace.

Supplies to bring:

**Embroidery Needle** 

1 skein of Embroidery thread (DMC, Cosmo or oth-

er)

Scissors

Pen and Paper

Optional: Hoop and Thimble

I will provide: Stitching material traced ready to embroider.

#### 2019 Block of the Month

The Block of the Month Committee met at the November meeting and have decided on the block of the month for 2019. Moda has started a new series of free blocks - Blockheads 2. We plan to use this as our block of the month for 2019. If you want, go to the Blockhead 2 website at <a href="https://www.bearcreekquiltingcompany.com/moda-blockheads-2018">https://www.bearcreekquiltingcompany.com/moda-blockheads-2018</a>. You can look at how other people are doing their blocks, do some of the larger blocks, or just see what's ahead. They also have a Facebook page you can follow.

We will choose 24 of the 6 ½ inch blocks, publish 2 each month in the newsletter, and add a few 'bonus' blocks for fun. You can do all the blocks or one a month, add extras to make a wall hanging, or a lap quilt for charity. The twist - at least one a month **MUST** contain a striped fabric - you don't have to use the same striped fabric in all the blocks.

Each quarter (April, July, and October) bring your finished blocks to the guild meeting, we will draw a name to win a prize. In January, bring your finished quilt or even a 'flimsy' to the guild meeting and there will be prizes for: 1) overall favorite, 2) favorite setting, and 3) best use of a stripe.

We wanted to start publishing the blocks in December so you could get a head start on the blocks. We are including the basic instructions provided by Moda and the first 2 blocks. The instructions and block directions are included as attachments in the newsletter email.

Soon after, she talked her husband into purchasing a long-arm quilting machine, and it's occupied a 12-foot chunk of our homes ever since.

Many of the quilts she has made in the past few years featured characters from video games. Not only does she enjoy customizing scenes and characters to her customers' nostalgia, but it helps keep her husband interested too. Recently, however, she's worked with more complicated designs, including a pair of intricate bargello quilts, one of which she says is the most challenging quilt she's made so far. Heather's next big project includes learning how to paper-piece, a skill she wants to use to make a Harry Potter-themed bookshelf quilt.

Heather loves using her long-arm quilting machine for charity; of course it feels gratifying to give back, but also offers her the freedom to learn new quilting designs. She also loves the challenge of finding uses for the odds-and-ends fabric in her stash, which both helps keep her fabric collection under control and helps her rationalize buying

more when she finds a great deal. She hopes to someday have her personal quilting oasis hidden behind a secret door in her home, giving her a unique space to show off to her friends and fellow quilters.

Heather wants her quilting legacy to be defined by bringing joy to those close to her. It's something special she shares with her mom, and looks for opportunities to share that experience with others. She's always grateful that her family and lifestyle support her hobby, and that it has brought her so

many special friends and experiences. She hopes she'll have the good fortune to continue quilting for years to come.

Olathe Quilters Guild General Meeting Minutes November 13, 2018

Mary Ellen Winter was invited to explain the plans for a Retreat at *The Barn* in Valley Falls, Kansas. It will be March 28-31, 2019. Cost was approximate \$266. A \$25 deposit was required. The membership then enjoyed dinner together.

#### **Business Meeting**

Mary Pacey began the business portion of our meeting by acknowledging the members with birth-days. She then requested a motion to approve the Secretary's minutes of the October meeting. 


